WORDS OF THE HEART

"THE JOURNEYS TO AND FROM PASSOVER"

As Rabbi Alvin I. Fine reminds us in our High Holy Day prayer book, "life is a journey." We can imagine all of life as one long journey, just as we can view life as a series of journeys.

When we consider the holiday of Passover in its entirety, there are several journeys. I write this article in the midst of the preparatory journey of Pesah: planning Seders both at home and in the synagogue. The Seder night is a reenactment of the journey from freedom to liberation, from sadness to joy. I hope you join in the congregational reenactment at our second night Seder on Tuesday, April 3. Glancing at the Torah passages we read during the Passover week we move from a *description* of Passover at the beginning of the holiday (on Tuesday, April 3, at our 10:00 a.m. Freedom Service) to the *moment of redemption* at the Sea of Reeds that we read from the Torah at the end of the holiday.

Life's journeys continue after Pesah. On Passover's first day we enter the fifty day Omer period that ends with our next major festival, Shavuot, our Feast of Weeks. For just over seven weeks we reflect on the spiritual journey of moving toward Sinai. It is a time filled with the ups and downs of life. On April 15th at Clark University our community will gather at 11:00 a.m. to commemorate Yom Hashoah, in tribute to the memory of the six million Jews and others who died during the Holocaust and honoring those survivors who are still with us. Monday, April 23, will be Israel's 59th birthday, a cause of celebration and gratitude for the daily miracle of Israel's existence and importance in our lives. Day by day, our tradition urges, we experience a day's journey toward Sinai. As Rabbi Yitz Greenberg states it, "Counting the days becomes the bridge from the social liberation that occurred on Passover to the constitution of freedom accepted and ratified at Sinai... We affirm the purpose of freedom is to live the holy life with ethical regimen."

It is difficult to express in words the joy it is for me to make the journey from Passover to Shavuot along with confirmation students. Each student demonstrates his or her own intellectual accomplishment, creative energy, and passion for being Jewish. It is an incredible journey for me each year and the source of so much blessing for me, the students, and our Temple Sinai. Join us for the Confirmation service on Tuesday evening, May 22. May the coming holiday of Pesah bring you much joy and blessing.

Tradition in First-Person Plural

Keeping Judaism Alive is a multidimensional, multifaceted and sometimes even a multimedia proposition. But no event instantiates the concept of Keeping Judaism Alive more personally and with such universal participation than our Passover Seder. Wherever in the world we Jews are on each 15th of Nisan, we make or we find a Seder. In late March of 1980, for example, my friend Kenny and I walked into Shabbat services at the *Tempio Maggiore di Roma* – The Great Synagogue of Rome which, from its perch on the banks of the Tiber River, overlooked the former ghetto where the city's Jews were required to live until 1870. Before the evening ended, Rome's Jews had settled their quarrel over the honor of hosting us for Seder two nights thereafter, setting our stage for an indelibly memorable Seder adventure that year.

At whatever table we find ourselves reclining, the object of and commandment fulfilled by each Seder experience is, of course, the vivid retelling of the grand Exodus pageant. And whereas unbiased narrative historiography is the customary method of chronicling bygone events, critical historical analysis is *not* the principal medium through which the collective memory of the Jewish people is kept alive. Indeed, while scholarly historiography always recounts in third-person plural terms – *they, them, theirs* – our Passover Seder is a unique observance in its first-person plural *reliving* of a group-memory. *We. Us. Ours.*

Surely no other historical occurrence has been kept so *personally* alive as our Exodus, and we owe the infinitely renewable vitality of our story to ourselves, having never failed to ardently nurture our first-person plural genetic memory (although I must say that the “*we*” religiosity of Red Sox Nation, unswayable even for the many who are geographically dispersed far from Fenway, makes an interesting parallel thesis – *that* story will always be told by the faithful as, “*We* were cursed. *We* finally won.”).

As we learn through Torah study, our Hebrew Bible is unambiguous in commanding memory. Its injunctions to remember are unconditional and the Hebrew word *zachar* (remember) appears in various forms no less than one hundred and sixty-nine times. And just in case we fail to be absolutely clear on the concept, the Torah often complements the “*remember*” imperative with its partner command, “*do not forget.*” But as Columbia University's Yosef Hayim Yerushalmi wrote, “collective Jewish memory is not about the historicity of the past, but its eternal contemporaneity.” Our tradition, in other words, is *not* a dusty obsession with antiquity, but rather our unique ability to personalize and *contemporize our memories*, thereby constantly *remaking* and *reforming* Judaism as a living thing.

At Pesach, we exemplify this by observing the Mishnaic command *b'chol dor vador* – in every generation we Jews must see *ourselves* as if we went out of Egypt. For in that phrase lies the latent power of the Haggadah to move our hearts. Through Seder ritual, liturgy, and even culinary elements, we internalize our Exodus with *personal ownership* of the pain of slavery, the struggle for liberation, and the ecstasy of freedom. Through Seder magic, we effortlessly reach across millennia to slip our feet into Israelite sandals as one unified people. And through our Seder tradition, wherever and with whomever we observe it, we again demonstrate to ourselves our stubborn determination to keep this Judaism of ours very much alive. Chag sameach!

RABBI BERNARD MEHLMAN

Rabbi Bernard H. Mehlman is Senior Scholar and Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Israel in Boston. Ordained in 1963, Rabbi Mehlman first served as a U.S. Army Chaplain and then as Assistant Rabbi at Temple Shaary Tefila in New York and as Rabbi of Temple Michah in Washington, D.C. from 1967—1978. He was ordained and later received his Doctorate of Hebrew Letters from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio. Rabbi Mehlman is the author of 15 publications and has also contributed several reviews for Catholic and Protestant Theological Journals.

Rabbi Bernstein served as Rabbinic Intern at Temple Micah in 1974 - 75 with Rabbi Mehlman.

Rabbi Mehlman is past Vice President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and presently teaches Midrash and Homiletics (sermon writing) at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.

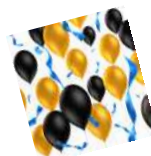
