"THE SECULAR AND RELIGIOUS DIMENSIONS OF OUR LIVES"

I am writing this bulletin article before Thanksgiving and you will be reading this message prior to Hanukkah. These two holidays urge us to consider the interplay between the religious and secular dimensions in our life. The pilgrims, who created our national and secular holiday of giving thanks, were inspired by the biblical holiday of Sukkot. In short, there is a religious foundation to the secular holiday of Thanksgiving.

Hanukkah is a religious holiday commemorating the struggle 2,168 years ago between religious and secular Jews that got out of control. Judah and his band of Maccabees were victorious not only against the more secularized element of Jewish society, but also against the secularized Greco-Syrians. The Greco-Syrians, whose Hellenistic reforms were instituted to contain the rebellious Jewish religionists, ruled a secular society that was unable to contain the religious forces within it.

Even today, there are religious and secular forces that shape our lives and the lives of others throughout the world. It is a formidable task for any one of us to find the proper balance between the religious and the secular dimensions of life. There is no shortage of evidence these days of religious forces that can lead to fanaticism. Religious terrorists in the Mideast and elsewhere are literally setting the world on fire. On the other hand, secular forces even in our own community steadily move to eradicate the religious perspective as well.

For example in the mid 1990's the National Conference of Christians and Jews changed their name to the National Conference for Community and Justice. At the time I did not care for the subtle inference that by association Christians implied community and Jews implied justice. Once again I am thinking about that name change because it took the religious dimension out of the NCCJ. Recently, the national organization of Interfaith Hospitality Network changed its name to Family Promise. While it is true that the IHN, now Family Promise, works with community and local service organizations, why ignore the 3,000 religious congregations that make up the bulk of the 90,000 volunteers, who, like ourselves, house the homeless families within our walls? We live in a secular society to be sure. But religion is also here to stay, not only in America, but throughout the world. As we go from Thanksgiving, our secular holiday, toward Hanukkah, our religious holiday of freedom, may we appreciate how fortunate we are as liberal Jews and individuals who can appreciate both the challenge and the blessing of balancing those secular and religious forces that shape our lives.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On November 7th, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations members voted to rename the organization to: the **Union for Reform Judaism**: Serving Reform Congregations in North America. While this was not an enormous change, it was certainly one that was fraught with symbolic and practical considerations. Simply put, the members of the Union felt that the time has come to publicize the fact that we are a Reform movement.

The vote by an overwhelming majority of the delegates attending the Union's Biennial convention was an acknowledgement that the largest and most vibrant form of Judaism in North America needed a name with which its 1.5 million current adherents could more closely identify.

Rabbi Eric Yoffie, president of the Union, stated "let me be the first to say that the most important part of any Jewish organization is not its name but its values and its mission" he said. The Union has assured us that their values and mission have not changed.

This is the first name change in one hundred and thirty years since the Reform Movement's synagogue arm was established. "In the 130 years since our founding, Reform congregations and the Union that serves them have undergone radical changes, growing into the largest and most dynamic religious movement in North American Jewish life," Rabbi Yoffie said. "The time has come for our name to reflect that."

The recent National Jewish Population Survey, the most comprehensive such study in American Judaism, found that while the overall Jewish population in America is declining, the Reform Movement is growing and is the largest Jewish denomination in North America.

We, as members of Temple Sinai should be proud of our position as a strong, vibrant member congregation of a larger, strong and vibrant community worldwide.
