WORDS OF THE HEART

"THE JEWISH WAY"

The adult B'not Mitzvah class of our congregation has enjoyed reading excerpts from a book about Jewish holidays written by Rabbi Irving Greenberg entitled, The Jewish Way. In his description of Hanukkah, Rabbi Greenberg states, "The Jewish way calls on every human quality and every skill known to humanity." In many ways, Hanukkah remains a challenge for us. In our own particularity, we are urged to look beyond our own concerns and to help others realize their own potentials. That is why we are involved in the Interfaith Hospitality Network this month. That is why, in general, we support both Jewish and humanitarian concerns now and throughout the year.

In closing the chapter about Hanukkah, Rabbi Greenberg makes the final point that the message of Hanukkah is about "creating family ties, communicating values and messages, holding and deepening loyalties." As we continue to envision a better world in which to live, so may we continue to build upon the strengths of other people so that some of our dreams will be fulfilled for good. The Maccabees persisted in their vision and executed a way by which they would live better lives. This Hanukkah, may we follow our dreams and cut out a path, a noble path, by which we can bring blessing to ourselves, our loved ones, our community and our world.

2006 marks the first time since 1979 that we will celebrate Hanukkah twice in the same calendar year (last Hanukkah's 8th night was January 1). During that second Hanukkah of 1979, I hitchhiked with friends down to the Sinai Desert (still in Israeli hands back then) to escape the wintry weather and the cramped dorms in Jerusalem. For just a few *Livot*, we camped out in thatched huts at *Dahab* which, despite being a frighteningly overdeveloped tourist destination today, was then only the barest sandalprint of a Bedouin fishing village.

Someone among us had thought to bring along a handful of mismatched candles which we wedged – the sun tumbling toward Egypt in the West and the Red Sea shimmering just a few meters from our hut's open door – into the desert sand. Lighting a shamash, and then the remaining candles, we recited the *brachot* – ...*l'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah...sh'asa nissim la'avoteinu...she'hecheyanu ve'kiyemanu ve'higianu lazman hazeh*. Thus illuminated, our eyes shone and our faces beamed in an exquisite Jewish juxtaposition of sand, sea, simcha and symbolism. Happy Hanukkah, indeed.

Beyond the explicit commandment to do so, something uniquely compels us to light Hanukkah candles. In the darkest days of Europe, Jewish concentration camp inmates saved bits of oil, margarine or shoe polish, fashioned wicks out of threads and enlisted spoons or scooped out potatoes to serve as menorahs, risking their already fragile lives to kindle a *ner shel Hanukkah*. And even Jews who rarely celebrate Shabbat are sure to fire up the menorah on Hanukkah.

Why? At Hanukkah we are harshly reminded of those who would uproot and destroy the Jewish People. The reminder ignites the spark embedded deep in the heart of every Jew to swear and demonstrate unequivocally: *We Will Not Be Eliminated*. When we place glowing menorahs in our windows, we send a signal to the world, in no uncertain terms, that we are here to *keep Judaism alive*. And the story of Hanukkah demonstrates the great lengths to which we will go to do just that.

Proverbs 6:23 tells us *Ki ner mitzvah v'Torah ohr* – “For the commandment is a lamp and the Law is a light.” But Midrashic tradition allows any of us to play with words and to ascribe meaning in *d'varim acharim* – other ways. *Ner* translates as lamp or candle, and *Torah* refers, of course, to *law* or to THE Torah itself. So if we abandon the original chiasmic form of the poetry, and interpret the passage linearly instead, *Ki ner mitzvah v'Torah ohr* applies perfectly to Hanukkah by telling us this: “For the candle is a mitzvah and Torah is light” (inverting the candle/mitzvah relationship).

When we light Hanukkah candles, it is, by definition, a mitzvah that commands and compels us to commemorate our will to survive. It a natural leap to follow that affirmation with a recognition that Torah continues to be the universal light that guides our resolve to keep Judaism *alive* and to keep Judaism *living*. The first Hanukkah in 164 B.C.E. rededicated the Temple in Jerusalem. At our December Synplex, we will rededicate our temple's *Ner Tamid* in Worcester. And the Hanukkah candles we light in our own homes are the mitzvah that rededicates our own commitment to the tenacious survival of the Jewish People, and to the light of Torah.

- Spend an evening reading Hanukkah and winter stories with your kids, or grandkids, or a friend
- Purchase a Hanukkah/Christmas gift for a child who might otherwise not receive one.
- Volunteer for the Interfaith Hospitality Network (see more info elsewhere in this Bulletin).
- Change all your light bulbs over to more energy-efficient ones (learn more at the December 1 Synplex!).
- Come to Erev Shabbat services - you get TWO opportunities this year: December 15, and December 22 which will also feature a Hanukkah dinner.

I hope your Hanukkah will truly be filled with light and joy!

The Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN) was created in response to the growing need to provide shelter, meals, assistance, and compassion to families without homes. Founded in 1986, the program now includes over thirty networks and over thirty thousand volunteers nationwide.

From *Sunday, December 17th – Sunday, December 24th* our Religious School building will become a temporary home for three to five families. This is the tenth year that Temple Sinai has participated in this program. For those of you who have volunteered in the past, you know what a wonderful experience it is! For those of you who have never participated, we want you to have a turn. You won't be disappointed.

There are lots of ways that you can help.

Set-up and break-down (1-2 hours each day); on December 16 at 12:00 pm and on December 24 in the morning. Transform our Religious School into a "home away from home" and back.

Dinner Preparation and/or Evening Hosts: we need as many as 14 people (or families) willing to spend an evening and/or cook dinner. Dine and socialize with our guests - a great experience for the entire family. Prepare dinner or donate breakfast items, lunch food or snacks.

Overnight Hosts: bunk up with a family member or friend for an IHN overnight. We need 2 people per night to stay at the Temple.

Perishable Food Items: we need people to shop for, or donate perishable food items every other day.
