WORDS OF THE HEART

OPPORTUNITIES TO MAKE OUR WORLD LESS VIOLENT

Soon we will celebrate Hanukkah. It is the only Jewish holiday based on a battle.

The Maccabean struggle resulted in the rise of the Hasmonean era, the last time Jews were able to rule themselves until the founding of the State of Israel. We will light our Hanukkah menorah, spin our dreidels, eat our latkes, and pray that our world becomes less violent and more peaceful. Not only can we pray, but we should act, to make the world less violent.

During the High Holy Days, I spoke of the recent city-wide effort to make Worcester less violent. In November, I participated in the first of several trainings of police officers and clergy, based on a model from Ft. Worth, Texas, to help reduce violence in our area.

Our congregant and clinical psychologist, **Dr. Evan Graber**, for years has championed an effort throughout our city to help us reduce male violence by challenging our notions of what it means to be male. The vast majority of violent acts in this country are committed by males. Evan will introduce and lead a discussion based on an outstanding film documentary, "**Tough Guise**," at Temple Sinai on two separate occasions. Strong, athletic and well known males offer testimonials hoping to challenge some of our important myths and misconceptions of what it means and what it takes to be male. Too much violence is done by males in our society and this program is an excellent vehicle to begin a discussion that can lead to action to help reduce violent acts in our area.

Please join us for a brunch, discussion, and viewing of the documentary on **Sunday morning, January 27, 2008, at 10:00 a.m.** We deliberately set this date as it is the week before the Super Bowl, a time when we might consider taking a moment to reflect on a different model of what it means to be male. All members of Temple Sinai are invited to attend. Also, on Monday evening, February 25, students and their parents in grades 7-10 will be invited to a pizza dinner and discussion of "**Tough Guise**" with Evan Graber.

The prophet Jeremiah proclaimed, "Peace, peace and there is no peace." May our actions and efforts result in less violence and more peace not only during this holiday season, but in the years ahead. May you and your loved ones enjoy this festive time in the best of health.

“They will make Me a sanctuary, and I will dwell among them.”

Thanks to the enduring excellence of our Religious School, Temple Sinai students know the 25th day of Kislev is the first day of Chanukah, marking the Maccabees’ liberation and rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem in 165 BCE.

However, Midrash (*Shemot Rabba*) teaches that the 25th of Kislev first became an important date on the Jewish calendar more than twelve centuries before the “Miracle of Chanukah.” It was on that day in 1312 BCE that Moses and the Israelites, meticulously following the detailed set of instructions issued on Mount Sinai, completed the *mishkan* – the tabernacle.

The *mishkan* of the young Jewish Nation was the first sanctuary designed specifically to house the *Shechina* – the Divine Presence. The blueprint for the Biblical *mishkan* is said to have been dictated to Moses by *Adonai*. But it was human talent, wisdom, strength, and creative intent that wove the design ideas into tangible, multifaceted realities. Building the *mishkan*, according to Torah, required the active participation of every member of the Israelite community who volunteered “*willingly from their heart.*” Each person’s contribution was needed, and each person’s involvement was different. But when the *mishkan* was completed, it held not only the *Shechina* of *Adonai*, but it also integrated distinct elements from each person in the Israelite community.

The ancient *mishkan* (from the Hebrew word for “dwelling”) described in the Torah is long gone. But throughout Jewish history the *mishkan* has remained the model of how we create a house in which to gather together as a spiritual community. King David obsessed over the *mishkan* specifications in his explicit construction orders to Solomon, whose master builders completed the first Temple in Jerusalem in about 960 BCE. And over the last two thousand years, synagogue construction has consistently followed the original *mishkan* blueprints as a model. Like Temple Sinai’s sanctuary, virtually every synagogue has at its front an ark containing the Torah scrolls, a menorah, a constantly burning *ner tamid*, and a large elevated *bimah*.

The specifications for the *mishkan*’s outer covering called for goats hair – ordinary material that made the tabernacle’s external appearance as simple as a Bedouin tent. But inside were exquisitely embroidered curtains of finely-woven white linen, coupled together with blue loops joined by gold clasps. Gold framework sparkled in lamplight. The allegorical contrasts remind us that the Divine Spirit that dwells inside each of us – our inner spiritual beauty – holds infinitely more significance than the outer shell displayed to the world. And from the perspective of our own synagogue, I can only return to one of my favorite quotes from a Temple Sinai founder, “a synagogue is not about the building it’s housed in, but what the people make it to be.”

As we look back on 50 years of Temple Sinai’s history, we can see that our faith community is a metaphorical *mishkan* in progress. Together, multiple generations of those who volunteer “*willingly from their heart,*” have made this synagogue a *mishkan* – truly a dwelling for our practice of Judaism. So many have given so much, and so many continue to give.

As we kindle the first lights of Chanukah, let us also pause to commemorate the anniversary of the *mishkan*. The rich celebration of our synagogue’s Jubilee anniversary stands as a reminder of how the combined work of a community can result in a spiritual dwelling that is home to us all.

MASTER SINGERS OF WORCESTER TO PERFORM JUDAS MACCABEAUS

On Sunday, December 2 at 3:00 PM at Temple Emanuel, the Master Singers of Worcester will present the first Worcester performance in many years of George Frederick Handel's epic work about the Maccabean struggle, Judas Maccabeus.

During the composer's lifetime, this dramatic oratorio was second in popularity only to Messiah. Recounting in music the liberation of Judea from the persecution of the Syrians, Handel's vivid score has many splendid choruses, and brilliant writing for soloists and full orchestra.

The Master Singers will be joined by the Master Singers Youth Chorus and Shrewsbury Youth Singers, and by guest artists baritone Solomon Cross, mezzo-soprano D'Anna Fortunato, tenor Daniel Mutlu (Cantor at Temple Emanuel), and soprano Marina Shemesh (Cantor at Congregation Beth Israel).

A pre-concert lecture "What is The Real Story of Chanukah?" will be presented by Temple Emanuel Rabbi Jordan Millstein at 2:00 PM. There is no additional charge to attend the lecture.

News From The 7th Grade

Our 7th grade **Hebrew Class** has gotten off to an exciting start. Becoming B'nai Mitzvah is an important components to our students' lives, and in our Hebrew class we are endeavoring to give our students the self confidence to lead the congregation in worship. Our study of the prayers and comprehension of the Torah portions are the major thrust in our Hebrew studies giving the students the opportunity to attain their goals.

On October 27th the entire 7th grade, along with several parents, our emissaries and Mrs. Sotak went to the New England Holocaust Memorial in Boston. It was a rainy, cold day but we all decided afterwards that although the weather was less than perfect for a field trip the gloom and dreariness felt appropriate for the subject of the memorial. Discussions followed about new knowledge gained, the emotional impact of the memorial and how the architecture of the memorial gave deeper meaning to the Holocaust experience.

A sampling of observations:

"It's hard to believe that so many people died" "The glass of the six towers represented the 'fragilness' of the Jewish people during the Holocaust." "When you were inside each glass tower you had a feeling of being trapped"- "but by looking through the glass with all the numbers etched on the glass it was as if people from the concentration camps were looking out." "The flickering embers were the souls of the people who died." "The smoke rising from the grates reminded me of the burning of bodies in the crematorium and memorial (yahrzeit) candles." A great deal of discussion followed the following Saturday and we talked a lot about the Niemoeller poem "First they came..."

We were very fortunate to have the emissaries, Chen and Iris, to add their own comments. Each tower had a plaque with the name of an extermination camp and Chen and Iris spoke about their memories of a recent trip they had taken to these camps. They also shared information about how Israeli students learn about the Shoah.

Many thanks to Chen, Iris, Steve Schuster, Bob Berman, Dan Jette, Harry Hubbard and Naomi Halpern for joining us. All parents are invited to join us anytime throughout the year in our class discussions!
