"LIFE CYCLE EVENTS AS TRANSFORMATIVE MOMENTS"

Ideally any crucial event in one's life--birth, Bar or Bat Mitzvah, marriage and death - should be a transformative event for the person and/or the person's family. These "hinges in time" are unique in that opportunities for personal and family growth are often more possible than at other times in one's life. Quite simply, at such times people are more open to change. Time and again I have been impressed that a person draws nearer to - or farther from - one's family of origin at these important life cycle events.

The Brit Milah, the ritual of Jewish circumcision, is from my perspective the most authentic and complete ritual we have in Judaism. Perhaps because it harkens back to tribal aspects of historical Judaism, perhaps because it addresses the pain of living, the presence of community and the miracle of new life and the responsibility of parenthood. For whatever reasons, lives can be changed through this ritual and through the ritual of naming when a young child enters the covenant of Abraham and Sarah.

Time and again, I have witnessed renewed commitment to Judaism after Bar and Bat Mitzvah ceremonies. Not every time, but quite often. While students and families in general are deeply touched by the experience, there are those individuals whose Jewish commitments deepen and whose spiritual and Jewish passions grow as a result of the experience of becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah.

Last spring I spent several months asking our congregants to consider how best to prepare for end of life matters. It is for that purpose that we held programs on "Better Endings" sponsored by Central Massachusetts Partnership to Improve Care at the End of Life. It is also for that purpose that I offered the text "A Time to Prepare" for those congregants who wanted to do more in this area of preparation so that your lives and the lives of your families would be improved even in the face of suffering and death.

A couple's wedding is a unique event in that theoretically more people can be changed as a result of this life cycle event than any other. The couple, each individual, each individual's family of origin, and the faith community - all potentially can be transformed as a result of the wedding of two individuals. For over twenty years I have met with engaged and married couples and offered them a counseling program "Prepare, Enrich and Mate" offered by Life Innovations. After the couple completes a written inventory concerning their relationship, the inventory is sent away to Life Innovations for analysis (at the cost of \$35.00).

Shalom,

By now, many of us have made our New Year's resolutions. Some of us have resolved to eat less, others have resolved to improve personal relationships, and still others have resolved to work towards making the world a better place. Whatever your particular resolution, I wish you the best in attaining your personal goal. I feel this will be a good trip to consider because (1) it is organized and subsidized by Federation; (2) participation by all of the area synagogues is encouraged, so even if a few families decide to go from each congregation, collectively there will be enough participation to sustain the trip; (3) it is a good opportunity to spend time with congregants and clergy from other synagogues in our region; (4) it is an interesting and cost-effective way to support Israel with your tourist dollars. Please give some thought to signing on for this trip – there is plenty of time to make your plans.

I'd like to take a moment to give special thanks to Cantor Claire Metzger, organist/pianist Ellen Linn, and the adult choir. Our Music Shabbat just prior to Hanukkah demonstrated a wonderful use of alternative instrumentation. Hanukkah songs were sung by our talented Evelyn Zarrow Adult Choir in Hebrew, English, Ladino and Yiddish. Piano, kazoo, maracas, guitar and tambourine brought the songs to life and created a wonderful entry into the holiday season.

The following week, Leslie Schoffemeer and a group of volunteers put together a Hanukkah supper that was really terrific, including much food, many menorahs, and plenty of schmoozing. After dinner, the nearly 175 attendees went directly to the Family Shabbat Service, featuring more Hanukkah music with our own "Cantor's Chanters". Thank you Leslie and helpers for your hard work, and the children's choir for your sweet sounds.

So with the holiday season past and the secular New Year ahead, I wish you all the best in 2005.

CANTOR'S NOTES

Happy Secular New Year everyone!

Before I get to upcoming musical events, I want to clarify the issue of the Temple organ and the use of an electronic controlling device (MIDI). There seems to be some misunderstanding about the use of this new equipment, and if this is my fault, I take full responsibility. There will be software installed in a small computer, which I will be able to access from the bima. This computer and software will be able to then instruct the organ to play songs that have been pre-programmed into it. The songs will come directly from the organ, thereby sounding like it is being played "live".

This new technology will be used to supplement the music we presently have. Its purpose is NOT to replace the organist, or to get rid of organ music at Temple Sinai. We are presently using only about 10% of our organ's capabilities. With MIDI, we will be able to not only record music, so that it can be used when our organist is sick or unavailable, but we will also be able to add different synthesized sounds, and even add tracks of other instruments to add to our musical repertoire. In other words, we will be able to add layers to our musical liturgy. We will also be able to have added rehearsal sessions with both choirs (at little or no cost). We are not taking away from the music of the temple...in fact, we will only be adding to our wonderful musical traditions. We will now be able to choose many different flavors of music...why only have vanilla, when you can have rocky road, or cookie dough? I believe we are starting on an exciting musical adventure, and I'm looking forward to it.

The *Cantor's Chanters* will be singing on January 14 at our 7 pm family service. There will also be a very special musical guest that evening. My daughter Sarah will be joining us that evening. She would like to teach the congregation some new camp-style songs, as well as song lead with her guitar. Sarah will be attending NFTY High School in Israel from January 30th through the first week of June, and this is her gift to us before she leaves.

Please mark your calendars for Sunday afternoon, February 13 from 3-6:30 pm. We will be having our second annual Zimriyah (song festival). It will feature the *Cantor's Chanters*, Israeli Dancing, song leading by Steve Schuster, a performance by Peter and Ellen Allard, arts and crafts, and of course, a wonderful pot-luck dinner. Details will follow, but please say yes when you are asked to help, plan to cook something, and come to this fun-filled family event.
