"A JEW'S JEW"

A rabbinic colleague recently delivered a eulogy in which he described the deceased as a "mom's mom". Each of us in our familial relationships yearns to be the best mother, father, sister, brother, son, daughter, husband, wife, or partner that we can possibly be. After all, our families love us and we love our families. The description reminded me of a question I was asked recently by another colleague as to what I thought a "rabbi's rabbi" might be. I responded that the rabbi should be an exemplary role model, a stellar student and teacher, and an extremely compassionate person who is devoted to deepening and strengthening relationships with Jews and other individuals. I also commented that all rabbi's should be self-reflective by nature, but a "rabbi's rabbi" should be most adept at self-reflection, particularly if he or she is involved in the congregational rabbinate in which there are so many pastoral demands.

But the question of being the best family member or professional can also be asked of the individual Jew. What is your conception of the "Jew's Jew"? In other words, what is your idea of the best Jew that a Jew can be? I believe the exemplary Jew would be knowledgeable of Judaism, devoted to Jewish worship and practice, and committed to bettering the condition of Jews the world over and making our world a better place in which to live. I believe the Jew would be a model world citizen but very much aware of his or her own particularity and how Jewish tradition helps to influence and guide him or her in every day decision making. How would you describe the ideal Jew?

All of this is not just theoretical. In a world in which antisemitism still exists, a world in which Israel is insecure and terrorism threatens us, we might want to consider how the Jew at his or her best might go about changing the world for the better.

There are overtures toward a more peaceful Israel at this moment in time. If we consider how acting at our very best might bring about a more peaceful world, this is no empty exercise. In the Birkot Hashachar our morning prayers, a Jew thanks God for being created as a Jew. We have the opportunity each day, just like Christians and Moslems, to consider how we might act our very best so that our world might just get one step closer to a world worthy of God's redemption.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Last month, Temple Sinai's Joy of Judaism Series presented "Jews and Jazz – Revisited", a program of live jazz performed by congregant Marty Friedman and The Octet. The musicians included Marty's fellow congregants Michael Whitman, Jacob Gorodetsky, Vitaly Sokolovsky, and friends Jeff Baskowski, Nunzio Roselli, Chris TenEyck, and Bob Zableski. Selections were taken from the "Great American Jazz Book" at Marty's discretion, and were varied in scope and beat. The music was rocking right from the start. Most of the composers were Jewish, and some were not. There were the Gershwin tunes, "A Foggy Day", and "My Ship"; Richard Rogers and Lorenz Hart tunes, "I Could Write a Book", "Have You Met Miss Jones", and "My Funny Valentine"; Oscar Hammerstein's "Hello Young Lovers". Other works performed were penned by Antonio Carlos Jobim, Clare Fisher, Miles Davis, Herbie Hancock, Dave Brubeck, John Coltrane, and Jerome Kern, to mention only a few.

The Octet played a wide variety of instruments: several trumpets, a clarinet, several flutes, a saxophone, both rhythm and bass guitars, vibes, piano, and drums. Many of the musicians switched instruments from song to song. There were many solo performances as the program evolved, which received spirited applause from the audience.

Although this was primarily a jazz concert, Marty interjected some interesting commentary. He described the high level of success that George Gershwin had in mixing classical music and jazz. Al Jolson had to choose between pleasing his family by becoming a cantor, or pleasing himself by becoming a jazz singer. One of the more interesting stories involved the history behind the term "Tin Pan Alley". Marty explained that in New York City during the 1930's and 40's, the heyday of jazz, songwriters would present their songs to music producers whose businesses were concentrated in an area of New York City near Herald Square, just a little south of the Theater District. Here songwriters auditioned at various offices by "banging out" a number on a piano that was always of minimal quality. The musicians joked that it was like playing a tin pan – and the name Tin Pan Alley stuck.

We thank Marty, Jacob, Mike, Vitaly, and the entire band for donating their time and effort. A great time was had by all.

The Joy of Judaism program is offering its next program on March 22nd at 7:30 p.m. in the Temple Library (rescheduled from October), "The Pursuit of Nazi War Criminals". This inside look into the hunt and prosecution of Nazis living in the United States will be presented by Robert Brill, an attorney who for many years has shared his extensive knowledge which he gained working as a Nazi hunter for the Department of Justice. This talk is sure to be fascinating, so mark your calendar and please try to attend. Our presenters put a tremendous amount of work into preparation, and our adult education committee works hard to plan, publicize, and set up these events. Let's support that effort and come together to schmooze, nosh, and LEARN!

REPORT FROM INTERFAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK'S ANNUAL MEETING

Temple Sinai has been with IHN since its inception in 1998. During this time 169 families have been served. 67 % of the families have found stable housing since leaving the program. The average stay of a family is 60 days. Seven years ago, typically, a single mother was the head of a homeless family served by IHN. Today, 58% are headed by both parents of the children, or a single father, or grandparents. This past year 26 families have been served, of which 35% of the heads of the families served are

PROFESSOR SHARON KELLER

Sharon Keller is Assistant Professor of Bible at The Jewish Theological Seminary, teaching biblical text courses as well as courses in biblical literature, the history of biblical Israel, and the literature and archaeology of the lands of the Bible. She was our Wolpert Scholar in Residence in 1992 and 1995.

Dr. Keller has presented scholarly papers on topics ranging from biblical literature to ancient Egyptian art, and has lectured on the Exodus, the afterlife, and women's studies. She has held teaching positions at New York University, Baruch College, Hunter College, and in the Metropolitan Museum of Art's School Education program. She is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature Committee on Egyptology and Ancient Egypt, and has served for many years as a judge for the National Jewish Book Award.

Dr. Keller has written and edited several academic books, most of which relate to the interplay between biblical Israel and ancient Egypt. Her most popular book, *Jews: A Treasury of Art and Literature*, published in 1992, was awarded the National Jewish Book Award in 1993.

Dr. Keller received her bachelor's degree and a master's degree from New York University's Hebrew Culture and Education program. She graduated from the joint program between The Jewish Theological Seminary and Columbia University's School of Social Work, receiving master of arts and master of social work degrees. She received her doctorate in Hebrew and Judaic studies from New York University.
