### **WORDS OF THE HEART**

#### **"BRINGING JOY INTO THE SANCTUARY"**

The Talmud reminds us, "Those who enter the month of Adar increase their joy." At this time of writing, we are in a leap month, Adar I, to be followed by our regular month, Adar II, the month in which we celebrate the joyous festival of Purim. This year Purim falls on Thursday night, March 20, with our Purim shpiel at 5:30, to be followed by our carnival. In the midst of a long winter that began with early snowfalls, it is an exciting prospect to think of the joy of Purim, spring training in baseball, and other possibilities of delight that can possibly come our way at this time of the year. This being a leap year when Jews add an entire month to our calendar, we have, as it were, additional time to ponder the possibilities of bringing happiness into our lives.

Our sanctuary will be filled with laughter and gladness on Purim. However the sanctuary is not only a place of semi-annual joy, such as Simchat Torah in the fall or Purim in the spring. Weekly we can feel the oneg, the happiness, of the Shabbat, and the simcha, the joy, of Jewish worship. This year's Shabbat worship through Friday Night Live, Synaplex Shabbatot and special fiftieth anniversary services, we hope that in addition to spiritual uplift, congregants of all ages can feel with ongoing regularity the joy of being Jewish when we enter, we worship, and when we leave our sanctuary.

Worship is one way to bring joy into our sanctuary. We also bring joy when we place tzedakah into our tzedakah box in the foyer outside our sanctuary. We bring joy into our sanctuary each time we bring food for Shabbat dinner, a tray of pastry for an oneg Shabbat. We bring joy into our sanctuary when we bring a guest with us to services and when we bring items of food and clothing to those in need. Social action activities are a constant source of bringing joy into the lives of other people. The process of bringing such joy into other people's lives begins with what we do in the sanctuary that is in our midst. In February, we brought back Rabbi Gary and Joan Glickstein into our sanctuary to joyously bless those whose lives were touched by Rabbi Glickstein's rabbinic leadership from 1977-1985. On March 28, we will have a Shabbat worship service in which our past Musical Director, Soloist and Cantors, David Kaplan, Harriett Katz, Cantor Wendy Autenrieth, and Cantor Claire Metzger will joyfully lead us in our prayers. The possibilities of bringing joy into our sanctuary are truly without end.

## MANAGING YOUR INVESTMENTS

In the business world, "Return On Investment" (ROI) is a popular method for measuring whether an expenditure produces a worthwhile result. A positive ROI means you got more back than you put in. A creative extension of this concept brings us easily to consider the ROI of Judaism.

With all investments, there are short-term and long-term returns to be considered. The purchase of an ad in our Jubilee Gala book (just for example) will have a positive return for our synagogue over the next 50 days. A family who maintains Temple Sinai membership across multiple generations sees a positive return over an extended period of, thus far, 50 years. And having invested continuously in the business of keeping Judaism alive, the Jewish People observe a positive return spanning 50 centuries.

Just like managing a financial portfolio through rocky economic times, our investments in Judaism require patience, persistence, perspective and a wise vision of sustainable growth. From the collective investments we've made as a People over millennia, our ROI is indisputably positive. The spiritual and cultural dividends we collect from the investments made in Judaism by prior generations are indeed a rich inheritance for us and our children.

When it comes managing our investments in Judaism, I first turn to Warren Buffett, generally considered the greatest investor of all time. Buffet likes to "ride a winner" – to invest in things he knows something about, and in things that have strong fundamentals – those factors that contribute to the well-being and increasing value of an investment. And as far as how long to hold on to an investment, Buffet says, "Our favorite holding period is *forever*." By the way, Buffett isn't Jewish, but the taxes on his 2006 purchase of an Israeli high-tech company did enrich Israel's state coffers by a whopping \$1 billion dollars.

There's also another way to look at our Jewish ROI. At Yom Kippur, we talk about *t'shuva*, literally meaning "return." With *t'shuva*, we make a deliberate decision that Judaism, Jewish ethics, Jewish souls and Jewish continuity are all worth investing in – we return to our Judaism and our Judaism returns to us. With *t'shuva*, we embrace Warren Buffet's advice by holding *forever* our investment in Judaism.

But the long walk to forever is made up of individual steps, and our immediate investments in Judaism are just as crucial as adopting prudent strategies for the long term. So we check the fundamentals and we commit to the long term with a strong portfolio that stands, in the words of Rabbi Shimon HaTzadik, *al shlosha devarim* (on three things). *Al ha Torah, al ha Avodah, v'al gemilut hasadim* – on Torah, on worship, and on acts of loving kindness do we construct a portfolio designed for a positive ROI. Balanced, diversified and perfect for the getting through rocky times. And if we regularly attend to the investments that yield a positive return over the next 50 days, and the ones that are profitable over the next 50 years, then the next 50 centuries can only grow to be very rich ones.

## NOTES FROM ROBIN

*Bernard of Chartres used to say that we are like dwarfs on the shoulders of giants, so that we can see more than they, and things at a greater distance, not by virtue of any sharpness of sight on our part, or any physical distinction, but because we are carried high and raised up by their giant size.*" (attributed to John of Salisbury, 1159)

I am regularly reminded of the giants upon whose shoulders I stand, as the Cantor of this wonderful congregation. I am awed by the talents, vision, and musicianship of my predecessors, and wish to acknowledge their contributions:

**David Kaplan** (1957-1977) served as Temple Sinai's first music director. David's discriminating tastes raised the musical bar in our congregation's fledgling years, and he planted the musical seeds that continue to flourish in our congregational soul, including debuting a cellist at Kol Nidre services.

**Harriett Katz** (1977-1987) ornamented our services with her magnificent voice and sparkling personality. The first woman serving in a cantorial capacity in Worcester, Harriett grew into her role, constantly striving to increase her knowledge and skills. She was a member of Temple Sinai's first adult Bat Mitzvah class, providing a superior role model for our community, and brought drama and music to our school with her inventive productions of Jewish-themed musicals.

**Wendy Autenrieth** (1987-1999) was Temple Sinai's first invested Cantor, and served our congregation in a full-time capacity, raising the level of professionalism of our staff. In addition to her role as Cantor, Wendy served as principal of our religious school, B'nai Mitzvah tutor, and choir director at Temple Sinai and the JCC.

**Claire Metzger** (1999-2006) brought her sweet personality and remarkably patient and kind demeanor to all aspects of her job, especially in working with B'nai Mitzvah and our children's choir (then called the "Cantor's Chanters"). Her innovations included musical field trips for that choir, and a newly-formed "Shofar Choir" at High Holy Days.

Later this month, our past cantors will bless and uplift us once again by leading the service music at our **Cavalcade of Cantors** service on March 28th. Please join us at 7:30 for the service, or come at 6:30 for a potluck dinner!

Finally, I urge you to join us on March 20 for our annual Purim Shpiel and Carnival, beginning at 5:30 - you're sure to enjoy the sports-themed merriment!
