DIVREI HALEV WORDS OF THE HEART

"A PASSOVER PUNCHLINE"

In thinking about my Passover message to you, I am reminded of a request from the New York Board of Rabbis during my first year as a congregational rabbi. I was asked to offer a radio message. The producer of the program asked me to offer a holiday message and concluded his comment with, "Make sure your message contains a 'Passover punch line.'" That has always stuck with me and it was as perplexing then as it is today. The "punch line" of Passover is all about freedom and human dignity that can only unfold in the context of liberation. There are still countless individuals throughout the world who yearn for freedom and live in conditions that strip away their human dignity.

This year as I consider the "punch line" of Passover, I am reminded of the words of Nelly Sachs, the Nobel Laureate, who wrote poems on the Holocaust and whose words still strike a chord in each of us.

"If the prophets broke in
through the DOORS of night
and sought an EAR like a homeland,
EAR of mankind
overgrown with nettles
would you hear?"

In a famous rabbinic commentary the question is asked, what is the relationship between the door and the ear? The answer is given, "the door, like the ear, can be opened and shut at will."

On Seder night we open our doors to admit symbolically the prophet Elijah, the forerunner of freedom. This year let us not only open our doors but our ears to hear the voices of all who need our help: all who are in broken families, all who are suffering from hunger and poverty, all who crave learning and opportunity, and all for whom freedom remains elusive. Such is my message with a "Passover punch line" this year. What would your message be? May you enjoy a healthy and wonderful Pesah and I look forward to being with you for our Passover Freedom Service, Tuesday, March 30, at 10:00 a.m. and at our congregational Seder, Tuesday, March 30, at 5:30 p.m.

NOTES FROM KIM

I have had several conversations with congregants lately about the choices of music for Shabbat services. I always smile a bit when someone asks if we can do the "traditional" version of any piece of liturgy, because "traditional" is very much a moving target. It is true, there are melodies that are nearly universal in liberal American congregations. But there is so much amazing Jewish music in the world! It is a challenge to balance familiar tunes, excellent new compositions, and the classics of the liturgical repertoire—all while leaving ample time for the Rabbi's excellent sermons!

Cantor Benjie Ellen Schiller identified four key functions of liturgical music. She writes of the 4Ms: **Memory:** music that creates a sense of connection to the past—on either an individual or communal level; the particular Temple Sinai version of the Shabbat Kiddush, or the Adon Olam you remember from your synagogue growing up. **Meditation:** music that enables a sense of introspection or reflection; for me, the instrumental Kol Nidrei is a shining example of this. **Majesty:** music that inspires a sense of awe and wonder. **Meeting:** music that brings us together and creates a community of prayer. She argues that a worship experience should touch on all four, although perhaps not all equally.

Of these four, the one that gets short shrift nowadays is *majesty*. With the exception of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, which are both largely **about** majesty, we tend to emphasize the other three in our services. Congregations want to participate. Cantors, and others charged with planning music for worship, strive to choose music that will engage congregants and get people singing rather than listening to a performance, however lofty. The Reform movement set the tone for this shift in focus back in the 70s when young people brought the music of Jewish summer camps—Jeff Klepper, Debbie Friedman, Craig Taubman, and countless others—into the synagogue. But while a singing congregation is, quite literally, music to my ears, I am mindful of the fact that some worshippers prefer to participate by **listening**, and that there is a vast repertoire to make this possible.

To that end, I would like to invite you to an evening of *majesty*. On Friday, March 25, the Evelyn Zarrow choir will join me to present an evening of classical Jewish liturgical music, featuring works by Lewandowski, Janowski and Binder, among others. (Don't worry, there will be some *meeting*, *memory* and *meditation* that night, too.) And mark your calendars for Saturday, April 10, when Sinai Singers will perform in concert with Yom Hadash...which will be an **entirely** different, but wonderful, source of musical inspiration to us all.

Join us April 10 at 7pm for our Spring Family Concert, featuring Yom Hadash. Their unique fusion of rock, pop and world music, with traditional Jewish music and values, will have you clapping along and dancing in the aisles.

Connections of Central Massachusetts* Launches Non-denominational Community Outreach Program to Assist Individuals and Families Affected by The Recession

Temple Sinai, is part of *Connections of Central Massachusetts, a collaboration of five area synagogues and Jewish Family Service of Worcester. *CCM is non-denominational, providing information, support and access to resources for those in Worcester County confronting the impact of the recession.

The difficult economic climate has hurt many of us. People have lost jobs or are working less; investments and homes have declined in value. Living on less, some people have depleted their savings or run up more debt on credit cards. Foreclosures have increased in Massachusetts, and Project Bread estimates that well over half a million people in the state are struggling to put food on the table. Many need help to figure out what they can do to prevent financial crisis, and where to turn for help.

Connection Cares wants to help people figure out that next step by offering one-on-one guidance and information about resources on a confidential and completely free of charge basis.

WE ARE SEEKING PEOPLE LIKE YOU TO STEP FORWARD AND VOLUNTEER SOME OF YOUR TIME AND/OR EXPERTISE in a variety of areas. Time commitment could be as little as two hours/month. Some skills include, *legal, career counseling, emotional health, financial services, health insurance, CCM Steering Committee, answering phones, mailings and other.*

Volunteers are not expected to provide ongoing professional services, but to advise where to get the help required.

TEMPLE SINAI'S FIRST MITZVAH DAY

More than one thousand dollars was collected by the students in Temple Sinai's "Fixing the World" special activity class at their first Mitzvah Day program!

On Shabbat morning, February 6, 2010, Temple Sinai students, their families, and members of the congregation participated in Mitzvah Day coordinated by the students in the "Fixing the World" special activity class. Mitzvah Day gave everyone the opportunity to contribute money to support various charities at home and in Israel. The students set up tables with a Tzedakah box and information about their charities, spoke about the work done by the organizations and answered the many questions asked of them.

The students collected money to support Packages from Home (which supports Israeli soldiers), The Jewish National Fund (water and forests), NEADS (Dogs for Deaf and Disabled Americans), Breast Cancer Awareness, Pennies for Peace, Birthday Wishes, and Large Print Prayer Books for Temple Sinai.

Coffee was available for the adults who brought in a non-perishable food item for Rachel's Table. Our other on-going Tzedakah projects, collecting empty pill bottles with the labels removed, and cancelled stamps for the veterans, were also collected that morning.
