WORDS OF THE HEART

"MY HEART IS FULL"

I write this column to express my extreme gratitude and heartfelt thanks for all those who labored to make a successful fundraiser for Temple Sinai in my honor. From chairing a committee to soliciting advertisements, from seeking donations to making contributions, from attending the Shabbat service or Saturday night dinner to making all the necessary arrangements for those events, dozens of congregants gave generously to ensure that Temple Sinai meets our fundraising goal for the year. I am most thankful to all who gave of themselves in any way. May the funds raised inspire us to give more in the future so that Temple Sinai can be even more effective in serving our congregants and the greater community. I thank you all from the bottom of my heart for your generosity.

For over two thirds of my rabbinic career, I have had the privilege of serving Temple Sinai. The relationships that we have developed over the years and continue to this day have been central to my enjoyment in serving as your spiritual leader. Throughout these twenty one years I have been honored to have leaders join with me in our common effort to inspire our congregants to gather, study, pray, and act in ways that God, Torah, Israel, and social justice will be more central to our lives. Temple Sinai allows all of us to grow and develop in spiritually meaningful ways, with the hope that our enthusiasm and passion for Judaism will enable us to become even better human beings.

Among the many things that make Temple Sinai uniquely wonderful is the way we welcome and seamlessly integrate *anyone* and *everyone* who wishes to participate in our synagogue family. Just how deeply, wholly and unconditionally this characteristic is woven into our temple's cultural fabric should not go unappreciated, however, because it was not so long ago that our present-day practices would have been nothing less than scandalous.

The virtual improbability of our survival as a people has left Jews with the gift/curse of a strong and enduring tribal streak. Just a few decades ago intermarriage was assumed to be the kiss of death to Jewish continuity, and intermarried couples rarely found a welcome mat outside the synagogue door. And despite the *halachic* prohibition of spotlighting such distinctions, even one who committed to Judaism by their own choosing was referred to (in hushed tones of subtle subordination) as *a convert*.

With all its historical flaws and fictions, the “ghetto mentality” of Jewish tribalism has faded considerably. In its place stands the far more positive and enriching practice of diverse and multicultural *inclusionism*, by which we open our arms to enfold *all* into our Jewish community to participate with true equality.

Nearly 30 years ago, Reform Jewish leader Rabbi Alexander Moshe Schindler (*Zichrono Livrocho*) declared a bold and controversial outreach revolution with the words, “We must remove the ‘not wanted’ signs from our hearts.” Rabbi Schindler went on to inspire Reform Jews to *own* the prophetic mandate of our tradition – to draw near all who might otherwise be disenfranchised or marginalized. These include Jews-by-choice, Jews who intermarry and their spouses, the offspring of intermarriages regardless of which parent was Jewish, and gay and lesbian Jews – all who might otherwise be called the “strangers at our gates.”

Rabbi Schindler had the vision to see beyond the “problem” of intermarriage to the promise of opening Judaism, as he put it, to “those seekers after truth who require a religion which tolerates – more than tolerates, *encourages* – all questions.” Under Rabbi Schindler's visionary leadership, our movement formally adopted a bilinear Jewish decent policy, reversing in 1983 the matrilineal descent law that had stood firm since the time of the second Temple.

But even in the modern era of enlightened outreach, our Temple Sinai stands out as an exemplary model because there is no equivocation in our practice here, and no ambiguity of attitude in our *inclusionism*. Temple Sinai's gates stand utterly unbarred, and we are not the least bit self-conscious, challenged, or pretentious about it. The fact is, colorblind *inclusionism* is so astonishingly embedded in Temple Sinai's institutional DNA, it is as natural to us as breathing.

In his day, Rabbi Schindler summed up his outreach vision, saying, “My dream is to see our Judaism unleashed as a resource for a world in need: not as the exclusive inheritance of the few, but as a renewable resource for the many.” Much longer ago, Sanhedrin Rabbi Yosef Ben Yochanan taught us even more simply in *Pirke Avot* with just six powerful words: “Let your house be wide open.” So it is at Temple Sinai, as we openly embrace our ceaseless tradition of change to constantly sustain the life of our Jewish practice and of our Jewish community.

PRESS RELEASE: TEENS AND CHILDREN INVITED TO SHARE WRITING ABOUT THE HOLOCAUST ON LINE

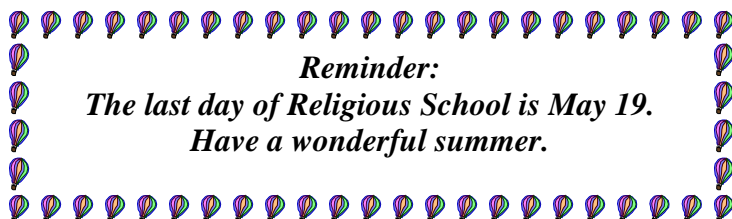
In honor of Yom Hashoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, April 15, D. Dina Friedman, author of "*Escaping Into the Night*", has started a blog for children and teens who wish to share their writing about the Holocaust. Friedman is seeking finished poems, prose and stories by children and teens in grades 4 - 12.

"I got the idea for the blog when visiting a group of middle school students at Temple Sinai in Worcester, MA, said Friedman. "I was asked to give a writing workshop as part of my presentation, and I realized while many students write to express their reactions to Holocaust history and literature, there aren't many venues for them to share their work."

The site currently features a beautifully crafted poem by 8th grader Greg Wong, called "*Sestina*". A *sestina* consist of six, six-line stanzas in which the same six words end each line in all the stanzas.
