## **"MAKING THE MOST OF WHAT WE NOW HAVE"**

Hopefully, by the time you receive this Bulletin, we will have received our copies of the new prayer book, Mishkan T'filah, published by the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Several years ago, our congregation experimented with a version of what is now the finished product. Both within our congregation and within the Reform movement at large, an enormous amount of feedback was gathered as to the merits and the inadequacies of the experimental edition. Here at Temple Sinai, not only did Rabbi and Cantor lead services with the experimental edition, but a few of our rabbinical students lent different voices and their own emphases to the new liturgy.

When we open the prayer book, the right page has the standard Hebrew prayer along with a modern, accurate English translation of the prayer. A number of the prayers are also transliterated hoping the prayers will be more accessible to people regardless of their Hebrew reading ability. The left page has modern readings that reflect a similar theme of the prayer, a different translation, a reflection, or a comment focused on the spiritual meaning of the prayer. Much of the delay in publishing the new prayer book was due to ensuring the readings on the left hand side of the page were as eclectic in nature with as broad an appeal as possible. So, finally, we have the finished product. How will the spiritual experience be different because we have the new siddur?

First, we will have a more common and relevant language when it comes to how we address God in the English text. Second, there are more prayers that open new possibilities to singing prayers that were not in the earlier prayer books in our movement. Third, the average worshiper will have opportunities to participate with the community on the one hand, but also to reflect and pray privately, on the other hand. Finally, the new prayer book is written so the text can be used more creatively. God willing, our new siddur will be a valuable tool for all of us to deepen one's own spirituality. We thank all those of the congregation who contributed to the purchase of these prayer books.

There will be an adjustment period, but as a congregation, we are not beginning from scratch. Most of what we encounter on the pages of Mishkan T'filah is familiar to the average congregant, and quite familiar to those who often gather to pray. Whenever we pray and whenever we gather in worship: "May the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to You, O God, our Rock and our Redeemer."

From the moment humans first walked on the Earth, according to Genesis and reams of rabbinical commentary, our responsibility has been *l'shamrah* – to guard our world from harm. Sadly, we have not done an especially good job of guarding the health of our planet, and while addressing this problem should always be a politically agnostic issue, it's also a no-brainer that environmentalism is a Jewish obligation. In fact, the Talmudic law of *bal tashchit* ("do not destroy") easily establishes Judaism as *the first ecological religion*.

The roots of *bal tashchit* come from the Biblical command to not destroy fruit-bearing trees while laying siege to a warring city. The Talmudic rabbis understood the idea that the trees, not being at war themselves, had the ethical right to protection from the humans in whose destructive path they stood rooted. But in ruling after ruling, the rabbis actually expanded the specific ban on tree damage to generally forbid all forms of wanton destruction. The great Rashi even argued that *bal tashchit* demands that we adopt a broad environmental ethic that views trees and the world as having an existence completely independent of human wants and needs. Maimonides took it seriously enough to call for beatings for violations of *bal tashchit*.

And with extraordinary pre-SUV-era prescience, Talmudic *bal tashchit* rulings even prohibit the *needless use of fuel*.

Clearly, Judaism has always been as much a religion of acting in the world as it has been spiritual and ritual based. Among the *tikkun olam* initiatives we are engaging in locally at Temple Sinai is to focus on how we can take personal action, encourage community action, and influence government action on *global warming*.

With our screening of *An Inconvenient Truth* in October, we begin a local process of dialog and action here at Temple Sinai, and join the broader Jewish community in addressing global warming. In fact, the Coalition on the Environment and Jewish Life, of which the URJ is a member, has specifically called upon Jewish institutions and leaders to raise public awareness of the moral and social-justice implications of climate change. COEJL's global climate change efforts include campaigns like "*How Many Jews Does It Take to Change a Light Bulb?*" I urge you to visit [www.coejl.org](http://www.coejl.org) to find out *what we can do*, and to join together on December 1, when our Syn-plex Shabbat will focus on our *tikkun olam* obligations to repairing our ailing planet.
