DIVREI HALEV WORDS OF THE HEART

"JEWS AND THE ENVIRONMENT"

Our member, Les Blatt, chairs our Environmental Concerns Committee. Over the past two years, in addition to Les having initiated a survey about the importance of environmental concerns to each of us, Les spearheaded the effort to have new lighting installed in much of our facilities. The beginning of our effort to be more conscious of the environmental impact on our lives parallels the genesis of the Hebrew Bible itself. It all begins with light. More light can be shed upon how Jews relate to the environment.

What is Jewish about protecting the environment? The source for so many of our good deeds and acts of righteousness are found in the Bible and in Talmudic laws derived from the Bible. Many of these laws instruct us to protect what the Jewish tradition views as "God's creation"—the totality of the physical and biological world in which we live. For example, one of the fundamental principles of concerns for the environment comes from Bal tashchit ("do not waste") that teaches us to conserve our environmental resources. Shiluach ha-keyn (the protection of the mother bird in our desire to feed ourselves) teaches us to safeguard all species from harm and danger. Shmitah (allowing the land to be fallow every seven years) teaches us that economic justice and ecological sustainability are intimately related. Shabbat, itself, reminds us that we are but one strand in the web of creation. When we consider the state of the environment today in light of these good deeds and values, it is clear that we have an urgent Jewish mission to establish a more healthy and sustainable relationship between human beings and the rest of God's creation.

There is so much more to say, and will be said in the future, about how we can better our relationship with our environment. More important than any articulation will be those individual and communal actions that we take to make our planet more humane and more Divine. It is more than coincidental that this Bulletin comes into your hands as the Sabbath of the Noah story is being read at our services. God's promise to protect our earth is symbolized by the rainbow. "This [the rainbow] is the token of the covenant which I make between Me and you and every living creature that is with you, for perpetual generations." (Genesis 9:12) As stewards of our planet, the rest is left for us to do.

NOTES FROM KIM

THE SPACES IN-BETWEEN

Claude Debussy once wrote that true music lies in the spaces between the notes. The Rabbis tells that the Torah is "black fire written on white fire." (Midrash Tanhuma, Genesis 1) What these two have in common is the idea that it is important to pay attention to the spaces in-between, because in actuality, this is what lends form and substance to our lives.

The Jewish calendar gives us this same opportunity - to pay attention to the spaces. The fall is almost a marathon for us...in the month of Tishrei we have four major holidays in roughly three weeks. Then comes the month of Cheshvan. It is sometimes referred to in Rabbinic literature as Mar (bitter) Cheshvan because it is the only month of the Jewish year with no holidays other than Shabbat and Rosh Chodesh (the beginning of the month). It is the "white fire" of our yearly calendar. It is the space we need to fully absorb our reflections from the fall holidays, to put Rosh Hashanah resolutions into action.

I'd like to encourage you to put some Temple Sinai into that space.

Those of you who were at services on October 17 heard the members of our Evelyn Zarrow Choir add their voices to our celebration of Shabbat. We would love to have you join us on Wednesday nights from 7:30-9:00 as we prepare new music and old favorites to enrich our worship services. Or perhaps you would like to add your voice as a Torah reader on Friday night. Please contact me to sign up or to learn more about either of these opportunities! Perhaps you are drawn more to social action, or to study, or one of many other ways to add your own "fire" to the life of this community.

It's also important, of course, not to fill in all the spaces of your world entirely. I know I struggle with finding that balance. I imagine most of you do too. Take time to enjoy and appreciate the spaces, and to listen for the music that hides within them.
