You have heard much about this effort by now and we plan to complete this effort in the coming days. In addition, we can fill our lives with blessings by filling our spirits with a love for God, our fellow Jews and others in our own community, right here at home. We can fill our lives by filling our days with prayer, study and good deeds.

The secular month of October, just like the Hebrew month of Tishri that almost coincides with October this year, is "chock full" of Jewish holidays that invite your attention, your attendance, your active participation and involvement. Throughout this month and into the coming year, you are invited to take part in communal gatherings, family services, Tot Shabbat and religious school activities, and adult educational activities that, God-willing, will fill your lives and the lives of others with blessings.

Will the new year and its blessings begin now together? With God's grace and our active involvement there is no reason why such blessings would not flow into our lives and the lives of those throughout our magnificent world.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

ANOTHER VIEWPOINT ABOUT KATRINA

"It is not in our hands to explain the prosperity of the wicked or even the sufferings of the righteous." So said Rabbi Yannai in the Mishna some 2000 years ago. In this context, it is hard to understand the position taken about hurricane Katrina's victims by Rav Ovadiah Yosef, a former chief rabbi of Israel. Rav Ovadiah is considered in many circles as a genius of halacha, his memory astonishing, his range remarkable. It is Rav Ovadiah's view that American citizens died in the hurricane because President Bush supported the pullout from Gush Katif. He goes on to state that Katrina was punishment for lack of Torah study, since black people don't study Torah. Oddly enough, a significant number of rabbis have concurred in this opinion. In light of Rav Ovadiah's influence in the Jewish world, Rabbi David Wolpe of Temple Sinai, in Westwood, California, has penned a scathing rebuttal in an op-ed piece in the Los Angeles Jewish Journal. He states, "It is painful to contemplate that a learned rabbi could be so parochial, so narrow, so besotted with our tiny people alone that he chooses to pour rhetorical venom on the victims of a hurricane a half a world away. I yearn to hear repudiations not from secular Jews, but from those who look to Ovadiah as a guide and a mentor". I strongly agree with Rabbi Wolpe when he states "there is no more poisonous strain in contemporary religious life than leaders declaring 'deserved' death".

As the president of Temple Sinai, it is my opinion that we all are entitled to our own view of any subject. My way may be correct for me, and your way may be equally correct. It is simply a matter of relativity, and there certainly can be more than one correct way to approach a given topic. I believe it to be important to respect others' points of view. But, I must conclude that sometimes people, especially those of influence, are not entitled to a certain point of view. The opinion of Rav Ovadiah in regard to the people of the Gulf Coast is such an example. Some views are universally accepted as wrong, and this is definitely wrong. I condemn this opinion, and would hope that both Ovadiah and his followers would apologize for spewing such heartless bilge. For this, and many other reasons, I urge each and every member of Temple Sinai to give as generously as you can to aid the victims of the hurricane.

The religious school year is off to a wonderful start! The *Cantor's Chanters* has a few new voices, the *Evelyn Zarrow Choir* has been rehearsing for the Holy Days, and there are twelve new students in religious school who are interested in playing the shofar for the family Rosh Hashanah service. Speaking of religious school, in addition to the music curriculum, I will be working with the sixth grade this year on Torah trope. I have scheduled five sessions with the students, where we will learn and practice the combinations of melodic patterns used in Torah chanting. The goal is to help familiarize the students with chanting, and help them become more comfortable with this system before they start Bar/Bat Mitzvah training. I am hopeful that this skill will not only be useful for B'nai Mitzvah students, but will be of practical application to them for the rest of their lives.

Our Holy Day season started the end of September with the Selichot service. I'd like to thank all the people who participated in the Yiddish music program that preceded the service. Thank you Bob Couchon, Mike and Molly Whitman, Les and Sue Blatt, Susan Hildum, Wendy Waegell, and our rehearsal pianist, Ellen Linn. The purpose of the program was to set the mood for the Holy Days, and I hope that we were able to accomplish that goal.

The *Cantor's Chanters* will be singing at the family services during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. I expect about 20 students to play shofarot, so don't expect to fall asleep during this service! In November, the group will participate in the Family Shabbat service. I am very impressed by this group, and anticipate a wonderful year of singing.

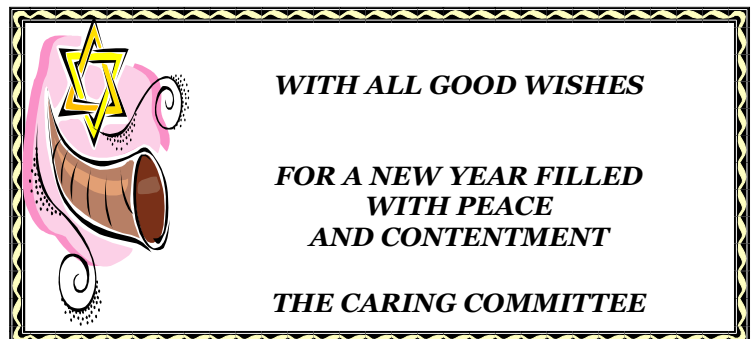

All donations must be in cases or cartons - sorry, we cannot accept individual items.

Items include: Non-perishable food items that are easy to store, distribute and eat - FULL CASES OF:

- Granola bars, peanut butter crackers, **PLASTIC** jars of peanut butter and jelly.
- Dry soup (Raman noodle soup, cup-of-soup)
- Cereal (Instant oatmeal packets, large boxes of dry cereal)
- Pasta
- Baby food (non-glass containers)
- Canned food
- Packaged **non perishable** ready made meals (Easy Mac, pasta meals etc.)

Donations are to be dropped off at **NAPAC, Inc.** at 229 Southbridge Street on **October 6 and 7th**. Everything will be packed onto pallets on October 6 & 7th. On Sunday, October 9th, everything will be packed onto the truck and sent to Utica, Mississippi and then distributed by "**Jacob's Ladder Disaster Relief Project**", a part of the **Union for Reform Judaism**.
