"WHERE DO WE PUT OUR ENERGY?"

Last spring there was a national rally in Washington D.C. calling on all Americans to do more to end the genocide in Darfur. In July, opposite the United Nations, there was a rally in New York City in support of our Israeli brothers and sisters during the Hezbollah bombing attacks. Two weeks ago, within a span of a few days, there was a rally in New York City once again calling on this nation to end the genocide in Darfur; as there was another gathering, just prior to Rosh Hashanah, near the United Nations in solidarity of our fellow Jews in Israel.

All of the rallies served as catalysts to increase our awareness, and more important, to motivate us to do more to end the genocide and to support our Jewish people wherever Jews are in danger. The tension between universalism and particularism is as old as Judaism itself. We have always been a minority population within a larger and diverse society. Even when we have had our own Jewish state, as fortunately we have the State of Israel today, Jews in the land of Israel have always been obligated to relate to other peoples and nations. At no time in Jewish history has the Jew been able, or should have been able, to only relate to his or her fellow Jew. As Reform Jews we have to relate to other religious Jews, just as we have to relate to secular Jews as well. In addition, the Jewish people in this country have to relate to other Americans, regardless of their religion, creed, age, sex, or race. As Jews, it is of our nature to relate to other people, regardless of how similar to us, or different from us, they happen to be.

But we have limited resources, personally and communally. How do we make the allocation as to where we put our energy, our resources, our commitment? Of the rallies that have taken place over these past months, I was able to attend only the rally this summer in support of our Jews in Israel. We all have to make choices and live with the consequences of those choices. May we go into this New Year choosing to do more to end genocide and support our fellow Jews. We can always give more of ourselves and do more for our Jewish brothers and sisters and the people of our world. The American Jewish World Service (www.ajws.org), needs our assistance, as do the people of Israel (www.urj.org). Sometimes it is not a choice of either/or, but both/and. Personal and communal wholeness (Hebrew *shleimut*) emphasizes the conjunct, not the disjunct. May our efforts during these holy days motivate us to do more for the Jewish people and the people who are still facing genocide.

This bulletin arrives during עשרת ימי תשובה (*Aseret Yemei Teshuvah*) – these words are commonly translated as the Ten Days of Repentance. But *teshuvah*, based on the Hebrew root of the word, more accurately translates to “return,” as in the prophet Hosea’s command, שׁוּבָה יִשְׂרָאֵל (*Shuva Yisrael*) – “Return O Israel!”

No matter where each of us finds ourselves on our personal spiritual journeys as the new year begins, there is relevance in the *teshuvah* of return. These ten days of cleansing and renewal return us and reawaken us to our true selves by stripping away the outer layers of misguided actions and distorted priorities. This *teshuvah* of intense self contemplation guides our return to the unblemished inner selves that lie sheltered from the distorted noise of the material and mundane world.

Our *teshuvah* ultimately leads us to atonement on Yom Kippur when we truly enter the new year having acquired a shiny new and true self that has burst to the surface, eclipsing the old, tarnished self that we resolutely leave behind. It is, this *teshuvah* of return, an honest examination of the spiritual and intellectual reality of who it is we really are.

Surely the return of *teshuvah* does not regress us, but instead repatriates us as individuals and as a people to the intrinsic essence of living in our Jewish skin. It is not solely or necessarily about returning to the *religion* of Judaism, but also to the rich Jewish core of our heritage, our self-identity and our culture. It is, after all, our very *Jewishness* that forges how we educate ourselves and our children, how we construct just and compassionate communities, how we work to live in harmony with the Earth, and how we work for a just and righteous society.

Ever since Sinai, Jews have been referred to as the Chosen People. But today, we are the ones who must make choices – we must be a *choosing* people. We can choose to return to our Jewishness on some level that is right for each of us. And we can also choose to return to our synagogue on some level that incrementally increases our involvement – that which we *give* to, and that which we *receive* from our Jewish community. After all, the choices made by our ancestors, both ancient and recent, are the very choices that have kept Judaism and Jewishness alive.

During Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we collectively experience a harmonious glimpse of what it is like to fill our temple’s sanctuary with *t’filah*, with song, with intellectual discourse and with shared human emotions of sorrow and joy. During these ten days of *teshuvah*, let us resolve to return, even incrementally, to Judaism, to Jewishness, and to our synagogue. Let us return individually and let us return as a community to the inner Jewishness that glows inside us whether by birth, by choice or by marriage.

When we conclude our High Holy Day worship this year, let us carry our ten days of *teshuvah* forward with a speedy return to our synagogue. And we don’t have to wait long for a compelling opportunity. Among the many events happening here in October alone, Temple Sinai’s first Synaplex™, a wonderfully diverse and rich celebration of Shabbat (and in this case – Simchat Torah, as well), occurs on October 13. I’m not exaggerating when I say you won’t want to miss this. I wish for each of you the greatest of health, happiness and prosperity of the soul in the coming year.

And, as we embark on 5767, I wish to thank each person who (by the time you read these words) will have contributed to the beauty and holiness of our High Holy Days. My heartfelt thanks go to every one of you who led a part of the services, prepared and chanted a torah or haftara portion, served as an usher, donated your time, materials, and funds, and blessed our community in myriad of both manifest and unseen ways - *Todah Rabah!*

On Friday, October 6, we will begin our celebration of Sukkot. Although not widely celebrated at home by Reform Jews, Sukkot is my favorite festival! The special prayer melodies are especially beautiful and uplifting; we are reminded of our connection to the land during this celebration of the harvest; and we welcome guests, both contemporary and ancestral, into our little shacks. Most importantly, Sukkot reminds us of the fragility and temporality of our lives. One minute, life is good - we are healthy, our kids are happy, the sun is shining. And then, in an instant - everything changes. This year, consider erecting a sukkah in your yard, or, at the very least, try enjoying a meal or two in the temple’s sukkah, without heed to the weather.

May each of us be blessed this year with health, with bounty, with the love and companionship of family and friends; and may we also be blessed with the awareness and appreciation of our daily miracles.

Please remember that there are two lanes of traffic. The right hand lane (closest to the school) is for pickup. The left hand lane (closest to Whisper Drive) is for thru traffic only. Please do not park on either side of the driveway going down towards Whisper Drive
