"MAKING YOUR OWN TORAH"

Visitors often comment that our B'nai Mitzvah ceremonies with our seventh graders at Temple Sinai are very personal and intimate. I believe that is an accurate statement, and for me, personal relationships with seventh grade students began with "making the Torah" with them when they were fifth grade students. While teaching fifth grade students each year, we make and illustrate the Torah as we move through the year's curriculum from Genesis through Deuteronomy. I am continually impressed with the creativity, originality and the artistic talent of our students. At the end of the year, after all the klei kodesh, the Torah adornments, are made and adorn our Torah, we place the fifth graders' Torah in the ark of our Religious School sanctuary. It is through the process of making the Torah when I begin to have a personal and close relationship with each student who, two years later, will become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. I believe for the Jew, Torah is as much about relationship as relationship is about Torah.

Later this month, I plan to go with our tenth grade Confirmation Class to New York for our annual trip. It so happens we will travel to New York just a couple of days after Yom Kippur and just before the festival holiday of Sukkot begins. We will literally see dozens of Sukkot being built outside of people's apartments in balconies and courtyards. We will even see communal Sukkot stretch over certain city streets in densely populated Jewish areas.

Beginning with Yom Kippur, all of us at Temple Sinai have the opportunity to celebrate the festival days during the month of October. We will joyously end and begin the reading of Torah as a congregation on the eve of Simchat Torah, on Monday, October 20, at 7:00 p.m. Please join us for this wonderful celebration. Even more important, join us often this coming year marked by study, prayer, and acts of tzedakah and gemilut hassadim, as together we "make our own Torah" through growing, deepening, and strengthening our relationships with one another. So many opportunities surround us that invite participation and active involvement. While the holidays are "late" this year, it is never too late to invest yourself in religious and spiritual activities that will make our community and our world a better place in which to live. It is never too late to make your own Torah.

Simchat Torah is a joyous celebration of Torah, coupled with the Consecration of our newest Religious School students. We mark the end of the reading for the year and begin again. With everyone participating, we unroll an entire Torah such that it reaches from the bimah all the way into the social hall, in the presence of our beautifully crafted tapestry of Mount Sinai. And to top it all off, as my children used to say, "it's the holiday with the candy bars!" More sweetness added to our synagogue involvement.

I had the pleasure of attending a service on a recent Saturday morning that was contemplative, heartwarming and inspirational. The service I speak of is Tot Shabbat. Having been one of the original organizers of this service, I have taken pleasure in participating for the last 13 years. How well I remember the first service. It was June of 1995 and, after much planning, I was unable to attend because both Sam and Madeline had the chicken pox. My other children did attend, along with the many other Tot Shabbatniks. Over the years, Tot Shabbat has evolved and continues to be a lively and rewarding worship experience. The important thing to know is that you do not have to be a small child to enjoy Tot Shabbat. You don't even have to be accompanied by a small child!

Happy New Year to you all as we move forward and together partake of the sweetness that is Temple Sinai.

NOTES FROM KIM

One of the most memorable pieces of High Holiday liturgy is Sh'ma Koleinu. Not only do we pray fervently over matters of life and death, but we preface these prayers with statements such as Sh'ma Koleinu. If we are to earnestly examine our own shortcomings, confess our sins and pray for renewal in the year to come, we plead that God will hear these prayers: Sh'ma Koleinu. Hear our voice, Adonai our God; have compassion on us, and with that compassion accept our prayer.

Historically, it was the Cantor's duty to speak, or sing, on behalf of the community. It might seem strange that an individual would say, "Hear our voice," but this is the traditional role of the Cantor--to serve as an emissary of the congregation. Through beautiful music and a higher level of vocal expression, it was thought that the Cantor's voice might be better suited to reaching the ears of God. Today, of course, we place as much emphasis on the combined voices of the members of the congregation raised in prayer or song, with the Cantor serving to lead and encourage participation.

And the task of raising our voices does not end with the final shofar blast on Yom Kippur! My task continues into the weeks and months to come and yours does as well. In all of our worship, it is of the utmost importance that the congregation not see themselves as an "audience." Although it is important to remember that thoughtful listening can also be an important part of worship, there is special power in the times when we literally hear all of our voices. Please sing!

Another way to ensure that God and the community hear our voice is by joining one of our choirs. In the coming weeks and months you will have opportunities to hear both our youth choir and our adult choir. I encourage you to add your own voice to their harmonies. Both choirs rehearse on Wednesday evenings: the youth choir from 5:45-6:15, immediately following Religious School, and the adult choir from 7:15-8:45. Sign up for our no-obligation 3 week free trial!

While making beautiful music is a top priority for me, to do so with the voices of our community is especially meaningful. Whether you join one of our choirs, sing aloud in the congregation, or express your own thoughts and prayers through the music that you hear, I pray Sh'ma Koleinu: Hear our voice.
